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CHAPTER 1 – INTRODUCTION & RATIONALE

Republic Act 10742, otherwise known as the "SK Reform Act of 2015", encourages the involvement of the youth in public and civic affairs through the establishment of effective, responsive and enabling mechanisms in institutionalizing youth participation in local governance.

Specifically, Section 8 (h) of Republic Act 10742 provides that the Sangguniang Kabataan shall partner with the Local Youth Development Council in planning and executing projects and programs of specific advocacies like good governance, climate change adaptation, disaster risk reduction and resiliency, youth employment and livelihood, health and anti – drug abuse, gender sensitivity, and sports development.

Finally, Section 24 (m) (2) of Republic Act 10742 provides that the Local Youth Development Council shall finalize the 3 – year Local Youth Development Plan, anchored in the PYDP and the local development plans of the LGU, which shall be initially drafted by the SK Pederasyon.

The Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP) shall refer to the comprehensive national plan expressing the convergence efforts of the different youth – serving agencies, civil society organizations, designed to promote the general welfare, development and empowerment of the youth, in preparation for their vital role in nation – building.

Further, the Local Youth Development Plan (LYDP) shall refer to the three – year strategic youth development plan formulated at the provincial, city or municipal initially drafted by the respective SK Pederasyon and finalized by the LYDC. This shall be submitted to the Local Chief Executive for inclusion in the Local Development Plan and subsequently endorsed to the Sanggunian of the local government unit concerned for approval.

To note, the Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP) and the nine (9) centers of meaningful Youth Participation serves as a framework for unified action among the youth and youth — serving groups, agencies and institutions to promote holistic youth participation in our society. It defines the duties, obligations and accountabilities of the national and local governments to address the economic, social, cultural, civil and political rights of the youth.

The PYDP has the following nine (9) centers of youth participation:

1. Health

6. Governance

2. Education

7. Active Citizenship

3. Economic Empowerment

8. Environment

4. Social Inclusion & Equity

9. Global Mobility

5. Peace – Building & Security

These centers have specific agenda statements to promote youth participation.

Furthermore, as to the nature of the LYDP, pursuant to Section 24 (m) (2) of RA 10742 IRR, the Plan shall give priority to programs, projects and activities that will promote and ensure the following:

- 1) meaningful youth participation in nation building;
- 2) sustainable youth development and empowerment;
- 3) equitable access to quality education;
- 4) environmental protection;
- 5) climate change adaptation;
- 6) disaster risk reduction and resiliency;

- 7) youth employment and livelihood;
- 8) health and anti drug abuse;
- 9) gender sensitivity;
- 10) social protection; and
- 11) capability building and sports development

As to the contents of the LYDP, the LYDP is a 3 – year strategic direction for youth development at the provincial, city and municipal levels. It shall be anchored on the PYDP and Local Development Plans.

The LYDP shall have the following elements in their plan, to wit:

- 1. Center of Participation refers to the priority Centers of Participation. The LYDP may contain all centers, or they may choose Centers applicable to their local situation;
- 2. Agenda Statement defines the LYDP's outcome/major goal statement per center. This may be adapted from the PYDP Agenda Statement, or a statement that may be crafted by the SK Pederasyon and LYDC that addresses the local needs;
- 3. Youth Development Concerns contains the issues/concerns of the youth in their respective locality/community, which need immediate action. These may be program, policy, or action gaps;
- 4. Objectives provides the specific result aimed to be achieved to address the youth development concerns within three years as determined by the SK Pede4rasyon Presidents and approved by the LYDC;
- 5. Performance Indicators is the measure used to assess the extent of success in achieving the objectives;
- 6. Targets states the extent of set accomplishment of the programs/projects/activities such as the number of beneficiaries, amount of budget utilized, etc.
- 7. Programs/Projects/Activities are the proposed youth development initiatives that are designed to respond to the youth development concerns as identified and approved by the youth; and
- 8. Priority Areas refers to the location (barangays, areas) where implementation of the PPAs will be focused and prioritized.

Hence, this Provincial Local Youth Development Plan (PLYDP) for the Province of Davao del Norte was laid accordingly to ensure the upliftment of the welfare among the youth in the province.

CHAPTER 2 – EXISTING SITUATION

2.1 **DEMOGRAPHY**

2.1.1 Population

The 2015 Census of Population and Housing shows that the population of Davao del Norte rose to 1,016,332 with an annual growth rate of 1.38%. The increase indicates that over a period of 5 years there was an increase of 70,554 persons or 14,111 persons every year. (PSA 2016).

Going back to history, in 1960, the province only had a population of 160,059 persons which is only about one sixth of the total population of the province in the 2015 CPH. At that time, the rate of population growth was considered high at 4.88% that contributed to the rapid population growth of the province in the past. Although there is a slowing down in the growth rate from 1960, the population continues to grow in size (NSO 2013).

If population will continue to increase at the recent growth rate of 1.38%, by the year 2020, the population of the province is expected to reach 1,088,423 (Table 2-2). From 2015, it is estimated that some 28,836 persons will be added to the population every year until 2020. It is also expected that population size will double in 51 years. It is important for policy makers and planners to seriously consider an increase and doubling of the population since it will definitely mean more mouths to feed, more children to send to school, more jobs to create and more infrastructure and services to provide (Rosenberg 2009).

Using the 2010 Census data¹, the median age divides the population into two equal parts where the number of persons with ages above the median is the same as those with ages below the median (UN-DESA 2013). For Davao del Norte the median age is 23.3 years old

in 2010, which increased from 20.8 years old in 2000 (NSO 2013). This suggests that half of the population was younger than 23.3 years old.

2.1.2 Population Distribution

Being the seat of the provincial government and the center of business and trade, Tagum City had the biggest population size that made up 25.5% of the total provincial population as of the 2015 Census Report. This was followed by Panabo City with a population share of 18.2%, the municipality of Sto. Tomas with 11.7 %, the Island Garden City of Samal with 10.2%, the municipality of Carmen with 7.3% and the municipality of Kapalong with 7.5%. The municipalities of Asuncion, New Corella and Braulio E. Dujali contributed less than 7.0%, while the municipalities of San Isidro and Talaingod both had respective contributions of 2.6% and 2.7% share to the population (Table 2-3).

2.1.3 Household Population, Number of Household and Household Size

A household is defined by the National Statistics Office (2010) as "a social unit consisting of a person or a group of persons who sleep in the same housing unit and have common arrangements in the preparation and consumption of food". It is differentiated from the institutional population, which comprises the persons enumerated in institutions, namely, jails/prisons, military camps, convents/seminaries, mental hospitals, leprosaria and others (NSO 2013).

As of 2015, Davao del Norte had a total household population of 1,006,888 and a total institutional population of 9,444. The total number of households increased to 233,232 or 9.49% from 211,099 of households in 2010. However, the average household size in the province was 4.3, which decreased slightly by 0.1 from 4.44 (PSA 2015).

2.1.4 Age and Sex Structure

The most essential demographic characteristics that can be generated in a census of population are the age and sex structure of the population. It is because they are important attributes that have a strong impact on the role of an individual in a given society (Riyaza 2000, Petersen 2001).

a. Age Structure

The age structure of a population is the distribution of the population in different age groups. The following is the table that shows the sex-age population of Davao del Norte for 2015.



Looking at the age structure of Davao del Norte, it can be gleaned that it has a very young population because about 61.49% of its household population is younger than age 30 (Madsen, Daumerie and Hardee 2010). Moreover, 23% of the total household population belongs to the 0-14 age group. Children in the 0-4 age group have the biggest proportion of the population with 11.01%, followed by those in the 5-9 age group with 10.85% and those in the 15-19 age group with 9.68% The population distribution in these age groups suggests that fertility had started to decline. A youthful population structure is also referred as a progressive population typical of a less developed country like the Philippines. It is characterized by a very high birth rate, slowly decreasing death rate and slow rises in life expectancy. Thus, the population pyramid is really a pyramid as shown in Figure 1.

b. Sex-Age Structure

The positive implication for a youthful population is that Davao del Norte will have an abundant supply of workers in the future and it is a matter of harnessing these potential workers to enable them to be economically gainful. On the other hand, a young population requires high investment in basic education and health care which burden shall fall on the economically active population. In addition, a population explosion will likely occur when this youthful population reaches maturity and form their respective families (UN-DESA 2004).

2.2 YOUTH POPULATION TRENDS

Section 2 of RA 8044 or The Youth in Nation-Building Act of 1995 declares that, "*Youth* is the critical period in a person's development from the onset of adolescence towards the peak of mature, self-reliant and responsible adulthood comprising the considerable sector of the population from the age of fifteen (15) to thirty (30) years." In addition, Sec. 3(n) of the IRR of SK Reform Act of 2015 (RA 10742) particularly disaggregates the sector into three (3): 15-17 – child youth, 18-24 – core youth, 25-30 – adult youth.

Serving as a guide, the following data will be helpful in giving an idea of the real picture of DavNor Province youth.

To note, said tables highlighted the youth (15 to 30 years old range) from a matrix involving all the age groups, based on the Census done by the rightful authority (NSO/PSA). The numbers were carefully computed and depicted in the tables provided.

2.3 YOUTH STATISTICS

As a major concern for the youth, presented below is the statistics concerning the youth with regards to health wherein there were three pressing issues and concerns, to wit:





Figure 2 above gives an impression that through time, there was an increasing number of filipinos who were infected of the HIV/AIDS. According to HIV/AIDS & Art Registry of the Philippines (HARP), the first case of HIV infection in the Philippines was reported in 1984. Since then, there have been 63,278 confirmed HIV cases reported to the HARP. Ninety-four percent (59,271) of those diagnosed were male and six percent (3,996) were female. More than half (51%, 32,254) were from the 25-34 year age group while 17,935 (28%) were youth 15-24 years old. The median age of the diagnosis was 28 years old (age range: 1 month – 82 years). Seventy-four percent (46,802) of the total diagnosed cases in the Philippines were reported from January 2014 to January 2019. Compared to 1 HIV daily cases in 2008, as of January 2019 there has been 42 HIV cases daily.

• A general picture of HIV/AIDS trends from the national down to local (provincial) is shown in Figures 2-11.

In September 2018 to August 2019, there were 12,559 newly confirmed HIV-positive individuals reported to the HIV/AIDS & ART Registry of the Philippines (HARP) as depicted in Figure 3. Ninety-five percent (11,911) of the newly diagnosed were male. Almost a third (32.1%, 4,031) were from the National Capital Region (NCR). But it's alarming to see Region XI that ranked 6th in newly diagnosed cases with more than five percent average in 12-month period (641) shown in Figure 4.











A line graph (Figure 5) above showcases a 5-year trend on Teenage Pregnancy in Davao del Norte province, highlighting on an average 17.6% increase. The highest (20.43%) percentage happened on 2014. Figure 6, on the other hand, shows that Tagum City recorded the highest teenage pregnancy of 560 cases (20.18%) followed by Panabo City and Sto. Tomas.



In terms of Suicide, a very alarming data is recorded from 1984-2017, with 19% of the cases among 15-19 years old, 14% of which also falls among 30-34 years old (Figure 7). Based on data shown in Figure 8, OSY tallied the biggest percentage on suicidal deaths, and most of the reasons are family problems and relationships conflicts with 76% combined data (Figure 9).







Education – focused, Tables 18 & 19 give an idea how youth put value on Education and sought education as driver towards success. Table 18 talks about the Household Population of youth who were currently attending school. Table 19 brought about the Literacy of the House Population.

In terms of Governance, the reformation of Sangguniang Kabataan is considered an overarching mechanism for youth participation in society, this was made possible by virtue of Republic Act 10742, or otherwise known as SK Reform Act of 2015.

Youth casted their votes during the recent concluded election proved the youth huge role towards Active Citizenship.

The IP youth within DavNor Province had been actively participating in various activities and concerted efforts to ensure that their welfare will be uplifted at all cost at all times. In addition to that the LGBTQ community ensured that their presence was felt in the activities, these moves proved that the province ensure that Social Inclusion and Equity had been strongly observed, pursuing the performance mantra of the Honorable Governor --- One DavNor, One Team, true to its word, no one left behind.

Peace – building and security – wise. Youth for Peace Movement (YFPM) spearheaded various activities involving the youth towards peace efforts in the province. Data had to be consolidated soon. In the efforts towards reducing crime, the Peacekeepers together with the rest of the force multiplier (including barangay functionaries) tried their very best to ensure genuine peace and order to prevail within the Province specifically on Drugs. Provincial Anti – Drug Advisory Council (PADAC) had been institutionalized to ensure that a body will overseer the smooth flow of operations and procedures in these noble efforts through Monitoring and Evaluation. Data had been collated yet for the purpose of confidentiality such data was not divulged.

To end, as to Global Mobility, the Province through the Provincial Sports and Youth Development Office, with the Youth Development Division as a lead, took an extra effort of helping the youth who engaged and embraced into exchange program through its in house Financial Assistance in Cross – Border Exchanges.

It is a fact that there were several data gaps identified, hence the Provincial Sports and Youth Development Office, true to its mandate has its ardent desire to institutionalize a Provincial Youth Assessment Study (PYAS) as patterned to the National Youth Annual Situationer (NYAS).

2.4 YOUTH ISSUES & CONCERNS

Seeing the fragility of the youth, their welfare is one of the province's topmost priority. Various endeavor were undertaken to ensure the upliftment of the youth's welfare, citing the Strategic Planning of the Provincial Local Youth Development Council (October 10 – 12, 2018), 2019 SK – LYDO – LYDC Youth Development Plan Assessment & Strategic Planning (March 8 – 10, 2019) the following issues and concerns popped out, using Appreciative Inquiry as clearly stipulated in Table 22:

CHAPTER 3 – YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PLAN

LYDP is a 3 – year strategic direction for youth development at the provincial, city and municipal levels. It shall be anchored on the PYDP and Local Development Plans.

Hence, DavNor Provincial Local Youth Development Plan embodied the PYDP and uplift the welfare of its youth populace.

3.1 LGU DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK

With regards to the local development thrust and policies, every endeavor geared towards attaining the Vision/Mission of DavNor Province, at the same time, achieving every aspects of the way the KUYA GOB development agenda towards the upliftment of the welfare of the youth for youth involvement plays a vital role in nation - building.

Knowledge management, education and sports;

Universal health and social services;

Yield growth agriculture and sustainable environment;

Adequate infrastructure facilities;

Greater livelihood and income opportunities;

Operational peace and development framework; and

Broad-based economic growth and investments

Remarkably, the Local Youth Development Plan of Davao del Norte strategically aligns its PPAs with the above-mentioned development agenda dubbed as **KUYA GOB**.

3.2 GOALS/OBJECTIVES/STRATEGIES

The LYDP geared towards embracing the nine (9) centers or areas of youth participation, to wit:

1.) Health

Strengthen youth participation in responsible sexual and responsible health; and Address and mitigate youth participation in sexual risk – taking behavior.

2.) Education

Increase and improve youth participation in education.

3.) Economic Empowerment

Promote youth participation in entrepreneurial activities.

4.) Social Inclusion & Equity

Promote the participation of indigenous people youth in society;

Promote the prosocial participation of youth with specific needs: abused, neglected, and exploited as well as street youth; and

Strengthen equal and equitable participation across genders (to address LGBTQ+concerns).

5.) Peace – Building & Security

Strengthen youth participation in promoting peace and order;

Optimize youth participation in the peace process, and ensure the access of youth in conflict – affected areas to education & economic opportunities; and

Promote the prosocial participation of youth offenders, delinquent youth, and youth in conflict with the law.

6.) Governance

Promote youth participation in government and bureaucracy.

7.) Active Citizenship

Strengthen enabling mechanisms for youth organization and participation: accreditation, awareness and assistance;

Engage the youth in the preservation, safeguarding, development, and promotion of Philippine Culture and arts; and

Inculcate volunteerism through the academe and community engagement and develop the traits of social awareness and responsibility among the youth.

Promote the participation of indigenous people youth in society;

8.) Environment; and

Strengthen youth participation in environmental activities: environmental protection, biodiversity conservation, climate change mitigation & adaptation smart cities, disaster risk reduction and management; and

Promote environment – friendly practices among the youth.

9.) Global Mobility.

With education: Promote youth participation in cross – border exchanges; & With economic empowerment: Support youth participation in cross Strengthen youth participation in environmental activities.

These centers have specific agenda statements to promote youth participation.

3.3 IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

LYDP 2020-2022 strategically aligns its contents to the PYDP 2017-2022 and identifies the youth development concerns in the provincial level and its corresponding goals or objectives on addressing them. More specifically, it portrays the particular indicators in measuring the level of success in implementing the identified PPAs with its respective targets and proposed budget.

In compliance to DILG MC no. 2019-151 entitled "Guidelines on Local Youth Development Planning, Comprehensive Barangay Youth Development Planning, and Annual Barangay Youth Investment Programming of the National Youth Commission," the Provincial Government of Davao del Norte uses the template or format for the LYDP. The said plan will be the basis of implementing any youth development programs, projects and activities stipulated specifically in each center of participation, as shown in Tables 16-24.
